Let us pray for everyone who has had to have a hospital appointment postponed, that they will not be too anxious and that their appointment will be re-arranged as soon as possible.



God's Creation, our role and EcoChurch - Part 4 - Recycling

Reuse, reduce and recycle are key principles that we can embed in our lives.

When I was a girl we used to get milk delivered in bottles on the doorstep and returned 'pop' bottles to get our deposit back; meat was brought from butcher, bread baker and delicatessen store. Rarely did we go further than our local shops. Convenience then took off, going to one major store and everything seemed to change to plastic. Also, our lives seemed to become incredible busy with emphasis on getting the next TV (colour), telephone (my first mobile was a brick!) ...etc. Consumerism became the norm and economic prosperity meant people had money to buy things. This has great benefits to our lives but the bible does caution about greed (Colossians 3:5) and selfishness (Psalm 119:36) and so we need to consider the impact on others.

I think most of us are now aware that this desire for 'things' has negative impact on our planet as we have got into habit of discarding items rather than repair and mend (again something more common when I was young). However, now we can support charity shops by sending unwanted items for resale (some take cloth that is too worn for recycling too), there are charities that collect and reuse furniture, some will take electrical items and the recycling centres will take other things too. I like watching TV show 'Money for nothing' which shows the amazing things that can be created from seeming 'rubbish' if you are the creative sort.

I think there was also a change to being 'cleaner'. Tea towels, reusable cloths for washing up, handkerchiefs got a bad press and we changed to kitchen rolls /tissues which could be thrown away. There is a balance here – any towels/cloths need to be washed regularly but most can be and, if you have a stock, you can easily rotate them. Tissues (especially at the moment) changing back to handkerchiefs may be a step to far but 'every little helps'.

Plastic has been highly evident on various wildlife programmes recently and this YouTube talks about the Life of a plastic bottle https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_6xlNyWPpB8 and shows how we can help. Whitstable is setting a great example by using 'keep cups' so that you reuse your coffee cup rather than using a disposable one. I was impressed by Big Church Day Out last year which only offered reusable or recyclable options, including refill water stations, so was a very evident Christian witness about the importance of the planet. We can encourage this change by asking about these sorts of aspects when looking at


events.

Are you confused about what can go in the recycling? I'm always worried I won't get it quite right! Key point is to wash out tins, glass, foil trays, plastic etc as they are seen as 'contaminated' if dirty. Canterbury has a great resource to use to find out what can and can't be recycled in the 'blue bin' and food bins. https://www.canterbury.gov.uk/homepage/43/where_to_put_your_waste

We can ensure we buy things that are recyclable (e.g. black plastic is not recyclable whereas plain and foil is). But what about all those thin plastics such as clingfilm, packages, films on food – these are not recyclable but have the same damaging effects. REDUCE your use of clingfilm by using beeswax covers which are reusable, OR cover with a plate/put in a reusable box. ECOBRICKs https://www.ecobricks.org/ are a way to use the

soft plastics that can't go into the normal recycling bins. Basically they are plastic bottles that are tightly packed with clean dry plastic pieces (the website shows you how). These can then be used for a variety of projects (garden to building) so that they are reused and don't go to landfill waste.

This is my attempt



Composting is now our friend and using our waste food bin. I suspect you do a lot of these already but we can all help and consider how we can get even better! Trying to upscale these to church may be more difficult but should we be challenging some

things to promote reduce, reuse and recycle? We already reuse school uniform, fairshare reduces food waste for those in need, but recycling needs us all to engage (and cost is an issue for church as council charges extra for 'business'.
