

The Repair Shop ...



.....that has been my 'must watch' TV programme this last few months. Have you been watching it? In the repair shop are experts exercising their skills in their words to 'repair, 'restore, 'renovate' or resurrect' any damaged or broken items, big or small, brought in the them. The item may or may not be

valuable in financial terms but to their owners they are very precious indeed. Some items have a long history and may more a great story to go with them.

Amongst the items I have seen brought in have been: an old clock, an oil painting, old leather bag and case, pieces (literally) of china and glass, silverware, threadbare toys, numerous gadgets of different kinds and materials, a child's rusty pedal car, a 1950's calculator, a split and stained lace tablecloth - just to mention a few.

At some stage of their restoration, all needed a clean of some kind. Great care being taken to sue the correct cleaning method. The correct tools and the appropriate substance to clean the with, in many cases just water applied using a rag or a power wash, as required.

The more I have watched this TV programme, the more I have noted its objective to be very similar to that of the church and Christianity. Even using the same words like 'restore' and 'resurrect' - yes the Christian Faith is all about restoring the relationship between God and man and about restoring relationships between individuals and nations. All about making new again. We are all familiar with the hymn that includes the line 'ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven'.

Some of the things brought to the repair shop have been rusty, black with grease, stained, faded, just dirty like the painting and the clock, the latter needed not only a new spring, and a repair to a spindle but also the removal of dust and fluff.

As sinful individuals we are constantly in need of being 'made clean'. 'Make me a clean heart O God and renew (or restore) a right spirit within me'.

Unlike the items which have to be brought to the repair shop and handed over to the experts to be restored or renovated, we have simply

to place ourselves and our whole lives into the hands of the master restorer, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. He doesn't have to open us up or take us to pieces to discover what is wrong with us. He knows everything about us. We just have to confess our sins and he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins. As we receive the forgiveness we are made clean, we are restored. However, unlike the items taken to the repair shop, which are repaired and taken away by grateful owners never to be brought back again, we are in constant need of coming to Jesus and seeking his forgiveness and cleansing.

When the owners return to the repair shop to collect their restored item, they are always overwhelmed to see the transformation in the object they brought in - perhaps damaged, bent, twisted, in pieces, not working, maybe dirty and stained - and they burst into tears, tears of joy just as there is joy in the Kingdom of God when we confess and repent of our sins and allow God through His son Jesus and by the power of the Holy Spirit to restore and make us new.
