'DEPENDS ON WHICH WAY YOU ARE LOOKING'

Those of us who log into "Zoom" for any of the three one-hour weekly prayer times organised by Tobi, usually start by greeting each other, enquiring about each other's health and have a general chat about what we should specifically pray for. Being a bit deaf, I don't always hear what is being said, particularly if two or more people are speaking at the same time. Last Sunday morning the first clear voice I heard was that of Phil Farnham who said 'Depends on which way you are looking'. I still don't know what Phil was referring to, but my mind turned to a situation I regularly face. It concerns the difficulty I have when I drive and reach the end of Vulcan Close, turning to go either up or down Borstal Hill. Sometimes it's due to the volume of traffic, often it's because cars are parked and block the view or because of vehicles speeding down or up the hill. Time and time again I have had to rely on another motorist waving me out or risk pulling out hoping it's safe to do so. There have been a number of times when I have only just made it and there are numerous junctions just like it all over Whitstable, Herne Bay and Canterbury. I'm making this point to illustrate that in life it's often important to look in more than one direction.

As Christians, there is only one way to look spiritually and know it's safe to do so. To begin with, Jesus calls us to 'Come to Him'. Then in John 1:29 we read 'The next day John saw Jesus coming towards him and said 'Look, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world'. Hebrews 12:2 says, 'Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfector of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God' or, as the King James version of the Bible puts it, 'Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith'. The Amplified translation puts it like this, 'Looking away (from all that will distract) to Jesus'. Then there is the old and well-known chorus that begins, 'Turn your eyes upon Jesus'.

Neither that chorus nor any of the scriptures I have quoted came to mind last Sunday morning at the prayer meeting, instead I found myself recalling a verse from a Psalm, 'God is our hope and strength a very present help in time of trouble' and words like 'We have a hope that is steadfast and certain' and 'All my hope on Him is founded'. The word 'Hope' was included in other people's prayers and was used later by several people leading different parts of the pre-recorded worship service. Later that day the word 'Hope' was mentioned by Micha Jazz, the new editor of the 'Every Day with Jesus' Bible Notes, who had written 'Choose to be an Ambassador of hope this year and live every day with Jesus' and in a prayer that followed, asked 'Lord as an Ambassador of Hope, help me to light up the world with the love of God'.

'Is life worth living?' Reply: 'It depends on the liver.' As a play on words, both meanings can be said to be true. But to make life really worth living depends on our looking in the right direction. To be looking at and to Jesus is the answer. In Him and in Him alone do we find not only hope for the here and now but for eternity. Look away in the opposite direction and there is only hopelessness, despair and nothing to look forward to. Truly we have in Him our Lord and Saviour, a hope that is steadfast and certain.

The chorus 'Turn your eyes upon Jesus' is actually the chorus of a hymn. Here are the words of the verses: -

O soul, are you weary and troubled? No light in the darkness you see? There's light for a look at the Saviour, and life more abundant and free!

Through death into life everlasting He passed and we follow Him there; Over us sin no more hath dominion, for more than conquerors we are!

His word shall not fail you He promised: believe Him, and all will be well: Then go to a world that is dying, His perfect salvation to tell.
