LIVE WITH THE CONVICTION THAT GOD IS IN CONTROL

'God sent His Son, they called Him Jesus; He came to love, heal and forgive; He lived and died to buy my pardon, an empty grave is there to prove my Saviour lives.

Because He lives I can face tomorrow; because He lives all fear is gone; because I know He holds the future, and life is worth the living just because He lives'

What a shock it must have been for family members, close friends and followers of Jesus the day He was crucified, not least because He'd always seemed so in control of every kind of situation. For them that day it was anything but a 'Good Friday'. Some of them had in the past witnessed Him changing water into wine at a wedding when the supply ran out. A few of them had been amongst the crew and passengers in a boat crossing a lake and heard Jesus rebuke the wind and waves when a storm suddenly blew up and the waves threatened to swamp the boat. Many more of them were present when Jesus fed over 5000 hungry men, women and children on just a few loaves and fishes. Then there were all the occasions on which Jesus had healed the sick, people who were crippled, blind, deaf, suffering from leprosy or a fever. There was no one like Him. He could cast out demons and even raise the dead. A handful had watched Him die, even fewer of them had carried his dead body and buried Him in a tomb and sealing the tomb before returning to their homes to mourn His loss.

Less than three whole days later the RESURRECTION CHANGED EVERYTHING proving to people then and now that God is in control, yes even in these times of a worldwide pandemic, good is and will come out of it. These past few days my attention has been drawn to the words of two of the Psalms – 33 and 121. I commend them to you. Read them, think about the things they have to tell us about God. Both remind us God is in control. Here are a few phrases from each that confirm that fact.

'He is faithful in all He does'. 'The plans of the Lord stand firm forever,' 'my help

comes from the Lord.' 'The Lord watches over you,' 'He will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and for evermore'. A further fact is that the Lordship of Jesus Christ is never truly tested until we are experiencing hard times. We need to believe that it is in the pain of life that God hasn't forgotten us and that He can and will bring something good out of our troubles. It's one thing to read Romans 8 v 28 but do we truly believe and accept what it says: 'that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose'?

Yan Hadley, an evangelist and a great friend of mine, (many years' ago I was privileged to take the marriage service of him and his wife Gail) in his book 'Answering today's problems', tells the following true story.

A professor at a college in Richmond, Virginia, was challenged by his students after he had addressed the morning assembly on the theme of Romans 8 v 28. They said 'But professor, you don't really believe "all things work together for good" do you?' The professor replied 'The things in themselves may not be good, but God can make them work together for good.' That afternoon he and his wife were out driving when they collided with another car. His wife was killed instantly and he himself was left a cripple. One day, several weeks' later he sent for the college president and said 'Tell the students that Romans 8 v 28 still holds good.' When, just over a year later, the professor died, his students had the verse inscribed on his tombstone. At the ceremony a local reporter asked why they had done this. They replied 'It was inscribed in his convictions, why not on his tombstone?!'

It is my belief that we can only accept and are in fact convicted of the truth of Romans 8 v 28 when we are convicted that God is in control and truly and firmly believe that Jesus lives and is the same yesterday, today and forever.

'..... You ask me how I know He lives. He lives within my heart.'
