
Prayer at the Heart



leave his country in the first place and God was in that, as He was when Pharaoh had a change of heart and sent his troops in great force to bring them back. When the Hebrews saw and realised the Egyptians were coming after them, they were terrified but did the right thing by calling out to God. They blamed Moses and Moses responded by saying 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today' (Ex. 14 v 13).

Although I am sure you know what happened next, read it for yourself. Exodus 14 v 14 to 31. The Lord's plan culminated in both protection for His people and judgment on the Egyptians, the Lord who is the 'same yesterday, today and for forever'. We all have 'Red Sea Experiences' in our lives. Those are the times when we particularly need to hang on and put our trust in God. This remarkable event in the history of Israel was not recorded just to amuse or amaze us. Romans 15 v 4b tells us exactly why it's there in the Old Testament, 'For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through endurance and the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope'. Next time you find yourself in a spiritual cul-de-sac remember that verse. A 'RED SEA EXPERIENCE'

I was driving along Joy Lane this week and at the point where you can see the sea I noticed it was low tide, probably lower than I ever remember seeing it before. My thoughts turned to a picture I used to have of 'The Sea at Whitstable' on a morning in February one year when the wind was so strong that it held back the tide and the sea didn't come in as the tide table predicted it would.

From that thought I then went into fantasy mode and imagined myself walking through a parted sea to the Isle of Sheppey, about half the distance between Whitstable and Canterbury. Of course, it wasn't long before I was thinking about Moses and the Israelites crossing the Red Sea (Exodus chapters 13 and 14) – a thought leading to me writing this short article.

My thought 'Where exactly did these people cross the Red Sea?' led me to Google and to my surprise 50 or more small maps came up on the screen with all the suggestions that scholars have come up with and believe me, within the fixed region there are so many variations, even though the Bible mentions a number of place names either side of the Sea. How far did they have to walk with the water piled up on either side of them? One 'expert' suggests it could have been as far as 16 kilometres, another 25!! Even more astounding is the number of people. Here is a quote from a Bible Study Guide written by Charles Swindoll entitled 'MOSES – God's Man for a Crisis'. He writes 'Although we are not given an exact count, many Bible scholars estimate the number of men over twenty years of age is listed as 600,000 Assuming that males over 20 constitute approximately one-fourth of the population the total number of Israelites involved in the exodus would have surpassed 2,000,000 people.' The important thing however is not the location of the crossing, the number of people crossing or the length of the crossing. There was a purpose. God's desire was that these people conform to a lifestyle that reflected His standard of righteousness. They and their ancestors had lived in Egypt for many hundred years – 430 years to be precise. For all those years Egyptian habits, culture and even moral standards would in ways big and small influence their lives. At the outset of their journey to



the 'promised land' they had many lessons to learn, one being recognising and accepting the presence of God. God went before them in a pillar of cloud by day And a pillar of fire by night. The Lord was their ever-present Guide. They needed to fall in with His plans, follow His ways, learn to trust Him in every situation. What better way to do that than put them to the test?
