ANNUAL DISTRICT CHURCH MEETING

The church's Annual Meeting will be held on Monday 15th April at 7.30pm at SCC. *Please note that this is an in-person only meeting and there <u>will not</u> be a Zoom link as in previous years. Please do try and attend this important meeting where we shall give thanks to the Lord for all that has happened over the last extraordinary year and a bit and also think and pray about the people we need to represent us on various bodies.*

One of the important tasks of the Annual Meeting is to elect those who will guide or represent the church over the next year. This year we need to elect to the Deanery Synod one representative. There are the usual three vacancies for our District Church Council (DCC) and two places on the Team Council (PCC) - if you are a member of the Deanery Synod or PCC you are automatically a member of the DCC too. We also elect the two Churchwardens and two Deputy Wardens. If you would like to serve in any of these ways or know of someone who would be suitable for one of these roles (please talk to the person before nominating them!) please complete a nomination form available from the Churchwardens or the office. Confirmation

On 6 June, 7 pm at St Mary's Reculver, a number of people from the churches in our Deanery will be Confirmed. Churchwarden

After incredibly hard working and faithful service to us at St Alphege Seasalter, Andrew Crocombe will be stepping down as Churchwarden (from the Annual District Church Council Meeting).

<u>Please will you pray as we seek a new Churchwarden to stand and fill</u> <u>this vital role.</u> Andrew took on a lot of additional responsibilities and work beyond the usual role, some of which he will continue - below is an outline of what a Churchwarden does.

CHURCHWARDEN - ROLE DESCRIPTION

The churchwardens are the senior lay people of the church and have a leadership role with the vicar. But their crucial role is one of management – not doing everything but making sure that everything gets done.

The technical stuff

Churchwardens are elected each year at the Annual District Church Meeting and may hold office for six consecutive years (unless the ADCM decides, in exceptional circumstances, that this may be longer). Canon Law states that *"they shall be foremost in representing the laity and in cooperating with the incumbent"* and that *"they shall use their best endeavours to encourage the parishioners in the practice of true religion and to promote unity and peace among them"*. Churchwardens are officers of the Bishop. They are ex officio members of the District Church Council, its Standing Committee and the Parochial Church Council.

<u>Buildings</u>

Churchwardens have a particular responsibility for the practical care and maintenance of the church buildings. They must maintain the Terrier (the record of all the land owned by the church), the inventory of the church's property and a logbook of any work done in the church. They will be responsible, with the vicar, for applying for a faculty (permission) for work to be done to the church building (only the Old Church because the Christian Centre is not a consecrated building).

<u>Money</u>

Whilst the DCC has responsibility for the financial affairs of the church the churchwardens should maintain a close relationship with, and support, the treasurer particularly in a large church like Seasalter. If there is no treasurer, it falls to the churchwardens to ensure that the role is fulfilled until a new treasurer is appointed.

<u>Services</u>

It is important that at least one churchwarden should attend each of the main services, not only to make sure the practical arrangements are in place (welcomers, AV, communion supplies, money counters etc) but also to be visible and available to members of the church family.

<u>Administration</u>

There is a great deal of administration in a large church like Seasalter. It is important that the churchwardens do not try to do it all, but they should make sure all the tasks are covered. They should know "how things work" (church members will expect the churchwardens to know!) and make sure any gaps are filled.

<u>The DCC</u>

The churchwardens will be regarded as leaders of the DCC. Their opinions will carry weight and they should do their best, with the vicar, to ensure that the DCC works smoothly and effectively.

The church family

The churchwardens carry a responsibility for the pastoral care of the church family even though this may work practically through connect groups and any pastoral network.

And finally, the vicar

Perhaps the most important of the churchwardens' roles. They should have a close working and personal relationship with the vicar and should meet regularly. They should ensure that the vicar and her family are cared for and supported and that practical issues like days off, holidays and expenses are in order. They should the "critical friend" of the vicar (but not too critical!), loyal and supportive but also honest, the people the vicar can turn to for good advice and encouragement.

lt's a great job!

Please Note We livestream our 8.45 service and occasionally other services, uploading these to our church YouTube channel.
